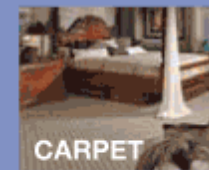
On this coming Independence Day on July fourth, the Elks will celebrate American liberty as members of an American institution – one in which American pride runs deep.
